- Plant containers will stay at the fairgrounds for the duration of the fair and can be picked up September 8th -10th.
- Containers size limits are above, however, total size including plant material and design should not exceed 5' in height.
- 9) Sevier County Fair is not responsible for any lost or stolen items or any damage.

staghorn sumac: the tree with velvet antlers



The staghorn sumac (Rhus typhina) is a very common and beneficial shrubby, deciduous tree found in a range extending from Quebec to Georgia, including all of Appalachia. It appears most often in dense thickets. But if properly cultivated and maintained, it can also be a useful addition to a pollinator and other native plant garden as both an ornamental and a food source for wildlife, especially birds, bees, and wasps.

A member of the Rhus genus, sumacs have such distant and exotic relatives as cashews, mangos, and pistachios but have a much closer relative in poison ivy, for the Rhus genus includes some woody vines as well as shrubs and trees. In fact, the staghorn sumac's other North American cousin, the poison sumac (thankfully rare in Tennessee), contains the same rashcausing oil (urushiol) as poison ivy. The staghorn sumac, however, is safe to touch.

The staghorn sumac is known for three distinctive features: its shape, its velvety branches, and its fruit clusters. The tree's general shape, that of an umbrella or dwarf palm tree, is quite distinctive along roadsides, in abandoned lots, and at woodland borders. It has a small stem (typically no more than 3 inches in diameter) hoisting up an abundance of compound leaves that spread out in pinnate fashion to form a rounded canopy at the top portion of the trunk

The large compound leaves (up to 18 inches long) are comprised of 9 to 13 opposing leaflets plus a tip leaf (hence the odd number) while the leaves themselves are arranged alternately. The leaflets are lance-like in shape with serrated edges and turn a brilliant red in the fall. The leaf stalks vary in color from green to red and are densely covered with fine hairs. The twigs also are covered with hairs, giving the young branches in particular a velvety appearance, much like that of a buck deer's new antlers, which is the tree's second distinctive characteristic and the source of its popular name, "staghorn."

A fast-growing tree (some would list it as a shrub), the staghorn sumac is not at all fussy about soil as long as its roots are welldrained and it stands in a sunny location. In rich soil, the tree can grow to a height of 16 feet with a width of 20 feet but is usually much smaller, more commonly closer to half those dimensions. It nearly always occurs with a thicket of shrubby companions, for the sumac propagates, not only by seed, but by numerous rhizomes that send up suckers around the parent like weeds and can become guite invasive. Although these suckers are easy for gardeners to remove, new ones are persistent in replacing them, making the staghorn sumac an unsuitable companion for nearby plants.

The tree's third distinctive characteristic is its fruit cluster, consisting of dusky red, upturned drupes, each containing a single seed. The overall shape of the cluster is conical and occurs at the branch tips. However, these clusters appear only on female trees because the staghorn sumac is dioecious-that is, produces male and female flowers on separate plants. This explains the needs for the tree to have so many suckers, the large colony improving the chances of having both male and female trees around the parent. The only way to tell the difference between the male and female trees is that the males flowers are slightly larger than the female and have golden stamens. Both types of flowers are pale green and occur in panicles, and both strongly attract pollinators, which the tree needs to transfer the pollen from the male to the female trees.

Native Americans and the early settlers used the tree's fruits to make a lemonade-like drink, often called sumac tea. The leaves, bark, and stems were also used as a dye. The staghorn sumac is also regarded as fire-resistant and largely pest and disease free.
