George Washington, the Military Hospital and the Amazing Role of Medicinal Herbs in the Revolutionary War by Master Gardeners Leo & Linda Lubke

- The PowerPoint presentation will be 50-60 minutes.
- The fast-moving presentation represents a good blend of General George Washington, his first military hospital, historic medicinal herbs AND PATRIOTISM!
- It is hoped that many of the colonial historic herbs will be included in SCAMGA's herb garden as a symbol of our patriotism.

As a special Happy Birthday treat to celebrate George Washington, there will be delicacies that relate directly to Martha and George Washington. You won't want to miss this presentation!

Leo and Linda Lubke reside in Kodak, Tennessee. They are both SCAMGA members — Linda (15 years) and Leo (25 years). They were originally from Western New York, but came to Tennessee in the mid-1960s when Leo was a Park Naturalist at the Great Smoky Mountains National Park. They returned to New York State to be closer to their families. Linda has advanced college degrees in education (Teacher in Special Education and Educational Administration). Leo, too, has advanced degrees, including an earned Doctorate of Education from the State University of New York at Buffalo. After 33 years in education (Linda at college and public school levels as a teacher and assistant principal (K-8) and Leo in public schools and at the college/university level), they retired and moved back to "their home" in East Tennessee. Once they returned to Tennessee in 2002, Leo met with Extension Director, Alan Bruhin and presented a case on the benefits of starting a Sevier County Master Gardener group. After many, many visits with Alan, SCAMGA was started in 2004. It is truly rewarding to see what SCAMGA has become!

Leo and Linda are members of many organizations including Rotary, Sons of the American Revolution (SAR), Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR), Societies of 1812 and library groups, to mention only a few. They enjoy 12 months per year vegetable gardening, their "bird and butterfly" garden and growing a variety of herbs and native plants. Their landscape has earned 12 certifications, including Tennessee Smart Yards. They have given presentations on a wide range of garden and native plant subjects, as well as topics of historical interest, to various groups. Leo was honored to have his article on the importance of native plants published in the Tennessee Conservationist magazine.

Always Learning

As my knowledge of gardening evolves, so does my desire to change my gardens from self-serving plots to areas that enhance our environment. I have begun to think about a bigger picture within my little space. I am now trying to create areas that will sustain all wildlife and not just the bees and butterflies.

Gardening for wildlife is a wonderful and sustainable approach to create a habitat that supports local fauna. Here are some tips to make your garden more wildlife-friendly:

Native Plants: Choose native plants as they provide food and habitat for local wildlife. They are adapted to the local ecosystem and support a variety of insects, birds, and other animals.

Diverse Plantings: Include a variety of plants with different shapes, sizes, and flowering times. This diversity attracts a wide range of insects, which, in turn, attract birds and other wildlife.

Water Sources: Provide a water source like a birdbath or a small pond. This is essential for birds, insects, and other creatures, especially during dry periods.

Shelter: Create spaces for wildlife to take shelter. This could be through dense vegetation, rock piles, or birdhouses. Brush piles can be particularly attractive for small mammals and insects.

PROGRAM

"Who We Are and What We Do." presented by Diane McCullen.

CALL TO ORDER

The business meeting was called to order by President Diane McCullen at 6:25 PM.

SECRETARY'S REPORT

The minutes of the November meeting were presented in the last newsletter. Karen Hall motioned to accept the minutes as written. Johan Oakberg seconded the motion. The membership unanimously approved the minutes as written.

VICE PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Andrew reported that the program for February will be "George Washington the Military and the Amazing Role of Medicinal Herbs in the Revolutionary War. The program will be presented by Leo and Linda.

EXTENSION AGENT

Matthew reported that the new Master Gardener Class will begin on Tuesday March 5th and will be held from 6 PM till 8 PM for 6 weeks. It will consist of online videos as well as hands on sessions. Matthew is also presenting Gardening webinars on 1/30, 2/13, and 2/27 and he welcomed all to attend these sessions. He is also planning a trip to the Biltmore in May.

DEMO GARDEN

There will be a workday on the Febbruary 23rd at 1 PM to help clear the garden and possibly plant daffodils. She requested volunteers.

TOMATO SEED PROJECT

Patsy reported that she is ordering supplies and that she will have the schedule for this available by March. She asked for volunteers.

GREENHOUSE

Karen reported that 14 flats of herbs were planted. She is also working on having grow lights installed. Plans to use the butterfly house were discussed but these will be placed on hold until written permission is obtained from the County.

PLANT SALE

Karen stated that there will be an early sale on March 16th from 10 AM till 2 PM. She also reported that work in in progress to showcase the process of gardening. There will be a vegetable, herb, and flower sale on April 20th from 10 AM till 2 PM. The Senior Center is planning to have their sale on April 27th. Diane asked for donations of birdhouses, pots and lightly used garden items for the sale. Outside vendors will be invited to the sale. Karen Less stated that QR Codes will be added to all sale plants to assist with education. Andy Bush suggested that if educational

classes are added that they be brief as long classes did not work out in the past.

NEWSLETTER

Diane requested that all items for the newsletter be submitted to Ms. Hyde by February 1st.

OLD BUSINESS

HOSPITALITY COMMITTEE

Patsy Farmar and Linda Douglas have volunteered for this committee. One more member is still needed.

TECH COMMITTEE

Diane requested volunteers for this committee to help strategize and implement Zoom meetings if members still would like to have this capability.

NEW BUSINESS DUES FOR 2024

A discussion was held about the proposed dues for 2024. Changing to \$25 per person and removing the family rate was presented by John Oakberg. Andy Bush moved that this change be accepted. Dixie seconded the motion. All present approved this motion. Dues are to be paid to Debbie Hurst.

NEW EMAIL

Diane reported that the new email will be seviermg@gmail.com. This was needed as the old account was hacked numerous times.

BOARD MEETINGS

AUDIT COMMITTEE

Diane asked for two members at large to meet with John to review the finances from 2023. This will occur in March. John will coordinate the meeting time and place.

STORAGE UNIT

The board decided that this was a costly expenditure and that it was no longer needed. The unit has been cleared out.

TREASURER'S REPORT

John reported that he is working on finalizing the expenditures of 2023. He stated that beginning in 2024 all the accounts will be in one place. The MG and JMG accounts are separate in the UT system. Beginning in 2024 you will only get reimbursed in the form of a check. This process may take up to 30 days. Tax exempt status can only be used when you purchase items with a UT card.

John requested that all members should keep records of their expense. When submitting for reimbursement the budget item name and the members name as well as if the expenses are for MG or JMG need to be included to assist with accurate accounting.

All projects that need funding need board approval. The board can approve expenses up to \$300. Monies greater than this need membership approve.

A draft of the proposed MG budget for 2024 was presented. The budget has deficit spending. The JMG budget was presented. Andy Bush moved that the budgets be approved. John Oakberg seconded the motion. The motion carried unanimously.

ADJOURNMENT

tomato seed project

Hey fellow Master Gardeners,

Patsy Farmer here. The Tomato Seed Project that SCAMGA sponsors is coming up soon. For those of you who are not familiar with this project, it is a program where we go into all the Sevier County Public Schools that have Kindergarteners and help them plant their very own tomato seeds.

First, the teacher divides the class into three groups. One group sits at their desk and colors a tomato worksheet that we provide. One group sits on the carpet and listens to one of our Master Gardeners read a book about tomatoes. (Linda Oakberg is a Pro at this!) The last group goes to a table where the Master Gardeners are all set up to help them plant their tomato seeds.

We usually schedule one school per day during the mornings. THIS is such a rewarding

project to participate in and you will not want to miss it!!

I'll have sign-up sheets with dates and times at our February meeting. Anyone who would LOVE to volunteer is welcome to sign-up then. Several of you have already expressed an interest in helping and that is totally awesome. We have already started with the prep work thanks to Collete Manke.

I am so excited about our upcoming Tomato Seed Project and I am looking forward to working with many of you. TEAMWORK divides the task and multiplies the SUCCESS.

At the January 22, 2024 general meeting, the budget for 2024 was approved. As part of the annual financial process, the Membership also voted to continue the dues at \$25. This applies to all members, even those in the same household. Remember that dues need to be paid by April 30, 2024. Checks should be made to 'UT Extension Sevier County' and given to Debbie Hurst (Administrative Associate), who sits at the desk right as you enter the Extension Building.

On the budget included in the newsletter, the totals spent for 2023 are shown, including the total end of the year amounts in the local and UT accounts. In the event you were unable to attend the January meeting, the following are the 2024 budget highlights:

Some program names have changed;

from the Treasurer

The storage locker budget is only for one month – we have given it up, saving us \$780 annually (the rental was increased twice in 2023, up to \$65 a month). We only need topay for January and should be getting a prorated refund for part of the month;

The \$1000 greenhouse/butterfly house budget is \$600 for improvement and maintenance, such as adding grow lamps. The remaining \$400 is for developing the butterfly house for use as a hardening place for plants and for education during the fair. If agreement on taking responsibility for the butterfly house cannot be reached with theFairgrounds, the \$400 will not be needed. These expenditures are one-timeimprovements, with future budgets to be less, primarily for maintenance;

The budget shows a shortfall of \$590 and there are sufficient funds in our total UT account to cover that amount;

The total ending UT balance is shown as provisional because the December UT account has not yet been finalized.

In the past, there have been two accounts for our funds, one held locally (limited in amount) and the rest at UT. Beginning in 2024, all funds will be at UT. If you have an expense or income, inform Debbie Hurst at the Extension Office:

Provide the budget item name and your name;

Indicate the amount and if it is income or an expense;

Give her receipts if you need to be reimbursed;

If income, give her cash or check (count the cash with her);

Be sure to designate Master Gardeners or Junior Master Gardeners.

It is important to tell Debbie the correct budget item. For example, if buying soil or seed used in the greenhouse for the Plant Sale, this is a Plant Sale expense and **is not a greenhouse expense!**

For expenses, unless someone at the Extension Office is available to make payment with a UT credit card, you need to pay up front and will be reimbursed by check from UT. Sometimes, thecheck may take about a month to come through, but it will. Some have taken only a week.

Let me know if you have any specific questions or topics related to the 2024 finances and I will address them at the next meeting.
