We are so lucky to have so many butterflies in our part of the world. I decided to dedicate this article to why these beautiful insects are important to our world. A large butterfly population offers numerous ecological, environmental, and socio-economic benefits:

Ecological Benefits

Pollination: Butterflies are important pollinators, particularly for wildflowers. They help in the pollination process, which is crucial for the reproduction of many plant species.

Biodiversity Indicator: Butterflies are considered indicators of a healthy environment and ecosystem. A diverse and abundant butterfly population often signifies a rich biodiversity and a well-balanced ecosystem.

did you know?

Tennessee is home to over 350 species of native bees, each uniquely adapted to pollinate the native flowers they evolved alongside. These bees can be classified into two main groups based on their behavior: solitary and social.

The majority of native bees are solitary, living and nesting alone, such as leafcutter bees and mason bees. On the other hand, social bees, like bumble bees, live in colonies that can consist of 50 to 400 individuals. While honey bees, an introduced species, are not native to North America, they have become a vital component of modern agriculture.

NEW BUSINESS


Certificates were handed out to Interns and those who volunteered to work in the Demo Garden in 2023.
