junior master gardener discovering the beginning

After learning about the diverse ecosystems of the Smoky Mountains during the fall and winter, Junior Master Gardeners visited the Cradle of Forestry near Brevard, North Carolina to discover the birthplace of forestry and forest conservation in America. It was here in 1898 that the Biltmore School of Forestry under the direction of George Vanderbilt and his chief forester Carl Schenck began.

Through tour guide Josh Rood, from Go Find Outdoors, JMGers went on a journey through the past as they learned about the school, its significance to forestry and how students lived "in the field" far away from civilization. They also got to "ride" a fire fighting helicopter simulator over a forest fire, then crawl underground and see the animals that live beneath the forest floor which were among many exhibits in the Discovery Center. Many JMGers remarked that they are interested in learning more about forestry and how it impacts us in the Smoky Mountains. The trip was segway into our Fall 2024 program on forestry.
