## October Meeting Info Monday, October 21, 2024 6:00 PM

Speaker: John Oakberg Winterizing your Garden Tools



For the October program, John Oakberg will discuss the essentials of safety and maintenance for both motorized and manual garden tools. He will also bring some tools for demonstration.

John emphasizes that there's much more to know beyond simply reading the manual, which everyone should

do. He'll cover safety tips, best practices, and insights that can help your tools last longer, perform better, and be safer to use.

From a young age, John and his brother Frank were intrigued by mechanical devices, particularly one-cylinder gas engines. They often disassembled motors to understand how they worked. Later, John worked as a small engine mechanic, which helped him gain valuable knowledge about keeping lawn mowers in top condition—information that often isn't included in manuals.

The maintenance requirements for gas-powered motors have evolved significantly since John's early experiences. Many of the complicated maintenance tasks are no longer necessary, and most maintenance can now be done by anyone, enhancing safety and reliability. No extensive mechanical or electrical experience is required—though reading the manual is still essential!

With the rise of effective battery-powered garden tools, many maintenance tips for gas-powered tools also apply to battery-operated ones. Regardless of the power source, the maintenance processes are surprisingly similar.

Feel free to bring any specific questions about your power tools, or ask for advice if you're considering a new purchase.

As I learn more about Holistic Gardening, I begin to realize that while I may pull a few more weeds and I may get a few less tomatoes, some of my biggest chores are reduced or eliminated. One of these jobs that has disappeared from my to do list is raking the leaves. Leaving fallen leaves in your yard or garden has numerous environmental and practical benefits. Here's why it's a good idea to Leave the Leaves:

#### 1. Natural Mulch and Fertilizer

As leaves break down, they provide essential nutrients to the soil. This natural compost improves soil structure and fertility, reducing the need for synthetic fertilizers.

#### 2. Wildlife Habitat

Leaves create a habitat for many creatures, including beneficial insects, spiders, frogs, and small mammals. Many species, such as butterflies and bees, rely on leaf litter for overwintering.

#### 3. Soil Health and Erosion Control

A layer of leaves can prevent soil erosion by protecting the ground from heavy rain. Additionally, decomposing leaves add organic matter to the soil, improving its water-holding capacity and aeration.

#### 4. Biodiversity Support

Leaf litter helps maintain a diverse ecosystem. Beneficial fungi, microbes, and earthworms thrive in these conditions, contributing to the overall health of your garden or yard.



#### 5. Energy and Time Savings

Instead of raking, bagging, and hauling leaves away, leaving them in place saves time and effort. This also cuts down on energy consumption from leaf blowers and reduces waste going to landfills.

#### 6. Carbon Sequestration

By allowing leaves to decompose naturally, you help lock carbon in the soil, contributing to climate change mitigation.

#### 7. Moisture Retention

Leaves act as a natural mulch, helping to retain moisture in the soil. This is especially beneficial in dry climates or during periods of drought.

#### Tips for Managing Fallen Leaves:

Mow them: Instead of raking, you can mow the leaves to break them into smaller pieces. This speeds up decomposition and allows them to integrate into the soil faster.

Create leaf piles: If you don't want leaves covering your entire lawn, you can create designated leaf piles or compost them.

Leaving leaves is not just about reducing yard work; it's about nurturing the environment and promoting sustainability in a simple, effective way.


## the water cycle and you
